At 11 am, the itinerary for the day one of the UNGA committee commenced with the Executive Board, briefing the representatives with the basic rules of procedure of the committee observing that most of them were novices. The agenda was established, along with the order of the General Speakers' List.

At noon sharp, UNGA began formal proceedings, with the first speaker being the delegate of Cuba. The delegate of Malaysia faced multiple POIs for their stance on Al creating more employment opportunities in the future. The delegate of Qatar went so far as to call an Al revolution as "Industrial Revolution 2.0", making the country's stance crystal clear.

A motion for an unmoderated caucus for 20 minutes was passed and then the first moderated caucus on 'The importance of Al-integrated social media in the current world with special emphasis on combating cyberbullying in the era of social media.'

The main idea, hidden somewhere behind the POIs, ultimately came to be highlighted that some countries accepting AI as an agent proved beneficial to them, while others believing it to be a threat to their national security, especially on the economic front.

The World Health Organisation convened with the chairperson Mr. Shivam Gupta, very humbly explaining to the delegates the agenda and the misguided knowledge of the point of difference between psychotropics and narcotics.

The musician Ringo famously said, "That's all drugs and alcohol do; they cut off your emotions in the end." Ironically, narcotics comes from a Greek word originally referring to a variety of substances that dull the senses and relieve pain. The committee further commenced with the delegates proposing how they would like to prevent the trafficking and wrongful overuse of narcotics The discussion of inaccuracies in healthcare contributing to the prevalence and consequences of drug over-prescription and misuse led the moderated caucus to talk about the relevant aspects of overdosing: doctors' perspective, what is overdosing, and the consumers' perspective.

The delegate of Ghana mentioned how socioeconomic factors like unemployment and poverty in a country feed to the addiction of drugs. The delegate of Yemen further proposed ways for the medical staff to be more efficient in handling opioids. The problem is concentrated worldwide, and the issue of addiction leaves the world governments no choice but to respond to it. *Sia Bansal*

A Call For Action

The coming year marks the halfway point in the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Sustainable Development Goals have been inspirina governments and citizens to take transformative actions, individually and collectively, for people and the planet, while cooperating and strengthening universal peace. Regrettably, the SDGs were already off track even before COVID-19 emeraed. Progress had been made in several spheres but that might not be enough to achieve the Goals by 2030.

The delegates were involved in the committee and had exceptional cooperation and teamwork, they talked passionately about how COVID-19 pandemic and other global crises have set us back and posed new challenges to development cooperation and, at the same time, have intensified existing trends like numerous inequalities. 2023 offers an opportunity to accelerate action to deliver progress for people and our planet.

Just seven years are left from the end date of the 2030 Agenda, it's tempting to see the SDG glass as half empty. But 2023 brings the possibility to reset and retry our agenda for humanity.

To this question the delegate of Turkey in G20 replied, "for sustainable development to be achieved the three important elements are economic growth, social inclusion and environmental protection. Turkey struck two earthquakes in Antalya in 2023 and help from other countries was reliable... Helping other countries is important and will help in achieving sustainable development. Because it isn't just one that has to protect their country, but it is the entire world that has to

ALL INDIA POLITICAL PARTIES MEET

Deliberation on the concept of secularism with the emphasis on blasphemy and communal violence

Discussing the human rights violation during war with special emphasis on the Russia-Ukraine crisis

THE HORRORS OF WAR



War for all its brutality has a predictable quality, the torture, the fear, the deaths.

The Russia-Ukraine war has instilled fear in the entire world, the constant looming of a world war 3 has everyone on their toes.

The delegate of Ukraine had relevant points during the moderated caucus, the delegate offered her condolences to Russia as well and mentioned how the war is not between Russia and Ukraine but rather between Vladimir Putin and Ukraine.

The conflict expanded in April 2014 when Russians seized territory in Ukraine's Donbas region.

The casualties in the Donbas had claimed 14,000 lives; nearly 40,000 people were wounded in the fighting. The UN High commissioner for Human Rights documented that 6,884 civilians had been killed and 10,947 wounded.

The war between Ukraine and Russia has stretched on for far too long and the deaths of the number of people keeps increasing.

The Onset of World War 3?
